JUNE MEETING OF THE GUILD- RAKU FIRING Sunday 12th June at Pitstone Farm, Ivinghoe near Tring. Tim Andrews, who has now joined Trisha Holden (the wife of the laté Andrew Holden) at South Tawton Pottery, will bring a fast fire raku kiln designed by Andrew Holden. Any member who has a raku piece biscuit fired may bring them to be fired. Stan Romer will also be firing the brick built kiln that is already there. The pot can be made of Raku clay or add 20 - 30% sand or coarse grog to a stoneware clay ( and for improved heat shock resistance 5 - 10% Talc). ## REVIEW OF RECENT MEETINGS AND EXHIBITIONS

Exhibition of Treasures of Ancient Nigeria at the Royal Academy
 January 1983

Against a cold, black background (the heating had broken down and was causing the curtains some agitation around exhibits used to a hot climate) were displayed some of the most prized treasures of Nigeria. Bronze and stylised terracotta heads from the Nok Culture of around 500 BC to 700 AD were at the start of the exhibition.

Serene, naturalistic Ife heads of the 12th to 15th century conveyed a sense of timelessness.

There followed a large section of 15th century Yoruba terracottas. Ample room was given to admire some splendid, large Benin bronzes of a pair of leopards and a human messenger of the 16th century. The sophistication and technical skill of these Benin bronzes contrasted greatly with a stone AKwanshi ritualistic figure of the same period.

BRIAN SHERWIN -A TALK ON ELECTRIC KILNS February Meeting

For the D.I.Y enthusiasts, this was an evening to iron out your repair and fault problems. For the likes of Murray Fieldhouse and Elsa Benattar who obviously knew what to expect, I, having had a hectic week at the office were staggered by "Are you with me", Brian's speed of delivery, speechwise. It took me all of ten minutes to tune up to his pace. He spent a lot of time on kiln re-wiring and wire in particular, noted as follows. You can calculate the length of wire required if you know the resistance and guage. The resistance value = guage x length. When replacing wires, work on a 50/50 basis. If two have gone in a bank of four it will probably work satisfactorally, perhaps three out of five. As kiln ages, resistance increases. As temperature gets to its peak resistance increases dramatically. At 750 elements become oxidized. Watch for brown speckles in oxide coatings. In using Kanthol Ai Elements, watch for deposits of pink dust on brickwork channels housing the wiring - it must be removed. When tracing elements through the brickwork, ensure that the tail is lined up exactly with the holes otherwise the element coils will certainly jump out of their housings on heating. Kiln brickwork, L.W. Brick (U.S. manufacture). They are more prone to

mechanical damage but he prefers them to ceromic fibre. Supplied in boxes of 20 at £i.20 per brick. Buy several more than your requirement because they break easily.

On a question about ceramic fibre kilns, he quoted a slightly slanted story about the cap who, when firing his kiln, fires his stoneware on the inside and his earthenware on the outside.
