
DACORUM AND CHILTERN POTTERS GUILD

COMMUNAL SALT GLAZE FIRING

This event dedicated to the God of Fire, had obviously deeply offended the Gods of Air and Water. It took place during repeated attacks of thunder, lightning and rain - but was nevertheless a steaming success -- well, the stokers (mainly Jerry Seaborn, Alan and Pauline O'Dell and John Cape's) were certainly steaming. What with the heat and the wet amidst the tropical rain forests of Murray's domain, the energy and enthusiasm of the above mentioned was praiseworthy indeed. They made a great team and were obviously enjoying themselves.

The kiln was presided over by a clay model of Mazda, the God of Light and Fire made by Pauline Ashley especially for the occasion.

The kiln was lit about 9.45am. having been packed the previous day. They were still going strong when I left them about 4 pm. the temperature inside the kiln looking to be about 1100°C by colour, but as yet no cone had borne out this judgment.

We had a barbeque going nearby which also had to fight the frequent showers, but the stokers kept their strength up with a sophisticated delicacy hitherto unknown to me, ie. roasted bananas in their jackets with chocolate sauce. I have to admit that this did not appeal to my jaded and effete sensibilities. I preferred our decadent junkfood of beefburgers, sausages and baps, cooked to perfection by my stalwart mate Harry, who had also done great service feeding the kiln monster with wood - under the strictest supervision by Jerry, of course.

About 14 people had put pots into this firing - 60 pots in all, which just filled the kiln.

The firing was finally over by 10.30 pm. Orton cone 9 down. The overriding priority for our heroes and heroine then was home, bath and sleep ———— probably in that order.
