RAY WALKER - Demonstration of making Earthenware Relief Tiles.

Ray Walker was trained in Three-dimensional Design and Ceramics and now teaches pottery full-time at Langley College of Further Education as well as pursuing his own work at home. He has always been more interested in the areas where painting and sculpture meet ceramics rather than domestic pottery. His interest in carving clay began through studying architectural reliefs and the sculpture of the Near East and India. He also paints in egg-tempera and recently has begun to combine this with the carved work.

He will be demonstrating his approach to carving into terracotta clay; also (if time) how ideas are carried through into sgraffito tiles.

NOTES ON THE WILLIAM DE MORGAN EXHIBITION AT THE VICTORIA AND ALBERT

(The Exhibition is on till June)

He was principal designer and brilliant kiln technician of a succession of tile and pottery workshops in London. His pottery, with its brilliantly coloured decoration, elaborately patterned, provides the ceramic counterpart to the textiles and wallpapers of William Morris. He was inspired by historic and Islamic sources, and was motivated as much by a desire to master forgotten craft techniques as he was by a need to solve design problems.

He started by designing stained glass for Morris' firm in 1860. During the firing of a panel of stained glass he observed that a metallic deposit was obtained, an effect similar to the lustre glazes of medieval Islamic pottery and one that he subsequently sought to achieve in earthenware tiles. He gave up glass for pottery, establishing his first factory in Chelsea in 1872. Two types of glazes were used; underglaze 'Persian' colours and overglaze lustres.

1900 was a period of technical and aesthetic triumph for De Morgan but he staggered from one financial disaster to another. One of his firings set the house on fire and another time he caused an explosion at the Ministry of Defence!

He developed neuritis and was forced to retire from pottery in 1907 but he then made his fortune by writing a best-selling novel!

MASK-MAKING MATERIALS

Those members who attended Jed Hoile's demonstration of mask-making may be interested in the list of materials and suppliers which he sent in for circulation:-

CELASTIC

Used as the main fabric of the mask. (Also good for puppets and lightweight 3D models built round wire armatures).

Celastic Suppliers

In single sheet form (each sheet yields approx 4-5 masks).

- Cost £5.80 per sheet for <u>66</u> (Thinnest grade good for awkward and detailed features).

£6.80 for <u>77</u> (Thicker grade good for covering large areas and large masks).

2) For larger quantities if required. (ie 20-40 sheets)

Please telephone for costs. This will be cheaper per sheet than The Puppet Centre's prices but involves a large order.

ACETONE

Industrial acetone (suitable for brush cleaning) is available. Acetone from chemists will prove very expensive. Used for "softening" celastic to a malleable state for modelling (its chemical effect on the resins in the celastic makes bonding possible). USE RUBBER GLOVES FOR PROTECTION. ACETONE IS TOXIC - VENTILATE THE ROOM WELL.

ALGINATE

Used to make very accurate face masks of real human faces. (Must be supported by an outer casing of plaster of paris bandage or mud-roc).

Please telephone for updated costs. Quite expensive.

Tiranti's supply many sculptural tools and materials.

(Plaster of paris bandage off-cuts can be obtained from local hospitals).

PLASTER

Used for mould-making when more than one mask may be required to be identical. Moulds should be thoroughly "vaselined" before applying celastic - use vaseline as mould-releasing agent. Good quality dental plaster is the best investment for long-lasting moulds!

POLYFILLA - PVA - FIBREGLASS TISSUE

A mixture (custard-like) of polyfilla/water + 1/5 PVA is used to coat the tissue and bond it to the celastic surface. This can then be sanded down to a smooth surface if required.

LATEX

Liquid rubber compound for making thin rubber masks from a mould.
