

#### **Soda Firings**

The soda kiln has been fired twice this year, and produced good results on both occasions. The April firing involved a group of six members, most of whom had been fired up by Peter Starkey's workshop last year and the subsequent firing when we had to find out how to do it ourselves. This June we invited all members to join us and the group expanded to include twelve people, including a couple of new members.

Last year we were on a steep learning curve, and had a number of problems to sort out. Using a flimsy pyrometer and cones that disappeared before breakfast, we had

difficulty judging the temperature rise and over fired the kiln. Now we are careful to dry the cone sitters thoroughly, and site them when they are properly aligned with the spy hole. We have purchased a much more substantial pyrometer, and Colin has drilled through a brick so that it sits snugly in the top of the door. This all works very well, and the pyro gives good readings that calibrate well with the cones, up to the 1200's. We also fire the kiln for a short while on the day we pack, to help dry out the newly decorated ware. The kiln also needs to dry, especially for the first firing of the year.

In April we tested the new pyro. On the day of the firing we had to contend with strong winds and squally showers. The firing seemed to go on for ever, but we got there in the end and finished before it got dark.

The weather was kinder in June, which was really lucky for us, given the Atlantic summer we are having this year. This time we used Bullers rings in addition to cones and the pyro. When the kiln was unpacked the rings were retrieved, measured and calibrated to check the temperatures achieved in different areas of the kiln. We discovered that the kiln had fired remarkably evenly - 1260 right across the back and 1280 at the front, with no differences from top to bottom. As we all use different clays it had been difficult to work out what was going on. Other factors affect the results, particularly the amount of soda used, and also the degree of reduction achieved. In June we used the usual amount of soda - 1.5 kg of sodium bicarbonate, and 200g of salt. However, this time there was a little borax in the bicarbonate solution, and that appeared to have enhanced the results. Next time we intend to use a little less of the soda and salt, but still include the borax because it also seems to bring down the temperature at which the soda glaze starts to form. Watch this space......

We are planning to have another firing on October 4+5 which is just after the AGM. The arrangements will be the same as last time.

- Bring pots at 10am on Sat to decorate with
- soda slips and glazes.
- Be sure to deliver all work for firing by noon.
- Stay if you can to learn how to pack the kiln.
- Join us during the firing on Sunday and
- bring a picnic to share.
- Your pots must be biscuit fired and of
- stoneware clay.
- Bring warm clothes and waterproofs,
- food and a thermos.
- Be prepared to share the costs of the gas
- and materials.

#### The Annual Exhibition – Help!

The exhibition is in a new place for us, and provides us with new opportunities. Hitchin is, of course an ancient and attractive market town. The exhibition is to be held at the 'Centre for the Arts', North Herts College, Cambridge Road, Hitchin, SG4 0JD, which is about a mile from the town centre.

The dates for the show have been refined. It will run from Tues 18 Nov to Fri 19 Dec.

On **Sat 22 Nov** we will have a private view party with a '**Meet the Makers**' event for the public. The times for this have yet to be finalised, but it probably would run from 10 – 3pm.

We will set up on Monday 17<sup>th</sup> November. If you are unable to deliver your work, I will collect it at the AGM and on the Open Day.

The gallery is eight square meters, well lit by a floor to ceiling window and many lights. There are glass shelves and plinths, and lots of hanging space for pictures etc.

The college catering department runs an excellent restaurant which serves Christmas lunches and dinners, and the hairdressers work from 9-2pm. on Saturdays

The college has already sent out its brochure of events, with us included. We will organise further local publicity nearer the time. All we need now is your support, so please put the dates in your diary, sort out your pots, and join in.

Afternoon a visit to potters co-operative 'Made in Cley' (functional ware / individual pieces) in Cley next to Sea, tea in Holt with Bircham and Appleyard galleries ending up in Cromer for overnight stay.

**Sunday** - Morning visit to Antje Ernestus (celadon and copper red glazes on porcelain) at Wood Dalling, lunch at a local pub and then travelling on to Ruthanne Tudball at Wellbourne Common.


This may vary a little with a possible addition on Sunday

#### Khnum (the Potter's God) and Jane Kilvington



Part of a limestone relief from the Dynasty XVIII Mortuary Temple of Queen Hatshepsut at Deir el-Bahri, Thebes. The ram-headed god, Khnum, is shown fashioning Hatshepsut and her ka upon his potter's turn-table, with the frogheaded goddess, Heket, in attendance. Khnum is the name the ancient Egyptians gave to their ram-headed potter's god. I sometimes invoke him, occasionally swear at him, but mostly I am just overwhelmingly grateful to him for the opportunities he bestows.

Life is full of surprises. When I retired from one profession, I was leapfrogged into a second. How could I know there was this power at work which had decided that I could enjoy life all over again at a potter's wheel? I have loved every minute in my workshop, it was the best gift Khnum could have prepared for me.

For 17 years I have been busy. Interestingly, even these have thrown up changes. It is the last change that I want to talk about.

It was quite by chance I saw a request for someone to teach potting to a group of cancer sufferers, Never in my life having taught anybody anything, I stuck my neck out and volunteered. And now for several months, under Khnum's direction, shared some of the excitement I have always found in making things.

Wonderful moments there have been. For instance, when the very uncertain member who "isn't any good at artistic things" is shown the glazed and fired object she or he last saw as a rather unsightly concave lump of clay with dashes of slip splashed on its surface and is finally aware that **everyone** can create things. Or the person who, on the last day, shyly found me and pressed my hand in gratitude for the fun she'd had. Or the several people who say they will seek out pottery classes in the future.

What none of these men and women realise is that this operation is a two-way thing. They can't possibly know what it feels like to be me. To be able to give all that pleasure is a privilege indeed. I feel that I am repaying Khnum and he is blessing the work. This kind of group responds to "play-time". It is therapeutic, it helps them express themselves, it makes a number of people into an integrated whole.

What do we do? We have four sessions per course. The first produces mostly tiles and house-numbers and other flat shapes rolled and decorated with slips. I dry them (my plate-heater has been a god-send), fire them and glaze them so that at the second meeting each person is aware of the possibilities of fired clay. On the second session each of 15 members has a mould and there is a chance to make something useful with more ambitious decoration (scraffito, wax resist, sculptured surfaces). And I work jolly hard to get them all turned round. The third week they decorate some ready biscuited pots with engobes, using for inspiration a range of paintings torn out of magazines or old postcards. The last week I

take a whole lot of animal shapes which lie around my house and get them to make an animal or something of their own choice.

Obvious? Of course it's obvious. I don't need to tell members of the Guild what we all know: potting is a very fulfilling human activity. It's just that I want it put on record the rewarding time I've had.

#### **Footnote**




